
## We remember our rights, our community and those who have died.

This year, Holocaust Memorial Day (marking the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp), was commemorated in school on Monday 29 January, providing time for us all to reflect on and remember the six million Jews murdered in the Holocaust, and millions who have been killed subsequently.

Introduced through a story during Tefillah, entitled "A promise of safety", some of our Year 6 pupils then shared their hopes and dreams for a better future. This fittingly mirrored representation by our Year 6 House Captains who attended the ceremony in the memorial gardens at Valentines Park the previous Friday.

Some of the pupils carried out individual research and debated ways to avoid anti-semitism, xenophobia and all forms of hatred, building on the work in all classes and the charters that reflect the rights of every child and citizen for the future.







The Boys Town Jerusalem Jewish Primary School Choral Festival was a poignant reminder of the respect our pupils demonstrated on all these solemn occasions. They continue to be a credit to their families and to the school.






# WORKING WITH JBD FOR PURIM


Providing opportunities for pupils to contribute to the wider community
