



AGE IS JUST A NUMBER - you're only as old as you feel!



experiences of others. The pupils are already looking forward to visiting the tenants at Aztec House again in the future. Pupils donated fruit to the tenants and everyone enjoyed chatting, colouring and playing games.

One of our visitors for Little Big Me Day - Olympic high hurdle runner Hughie Teape - promoted such passion for his sport that our pupils are now eager to follow his footsteps and fulfil their own dreams.

Year I enjoyed learning about breathalysing, whilst some pupils in Year 3 showed they are already aspiring to becoming police officers themselves. Others are hoping to become civil engineers. 




ACROSS OUR COMMUNITIES...

BOOK DAY AND SCIENCE WEEK - engaging with book worms and mad scientists!



For Science week, pupils enjoyed taking part in a variety of fun and practical experiments across all year groups. They looked at planting and growing in Year I, water absorption in Year 2 and powering LEDs with potatoes and lemons in Years 3 and 4. Year 5 developed their own experiments which they exhibited at the KKS Science Fair. Some of the experiments included petrified pepper, a bubble inside a bubble, gravitating blood, magic milk and fluffy slime. Year 6 carried out a series of experiments investigating light including a disappearing shot glass, a reversing arrow, a disappearing coin and creating a shadow story. SPEAKING OUT AND STAYING SAFE!


Safety is paramount at WIJPS and we have been focusing on different aspects of safety this term, as pupils participated in an NSPCC assembly followed by workshops in Years 5 and 6. The "Speak out Stay Safe" campaign aims to equip pupils with the knowledge and understanding they need to stay safe from abuse and neglect.

Pupils were taught to speak out to a grown up if they are worried, and it was stressed this should be either to a trusted adult or to "Childline."

Separately, the school completed its bi-annual audit for H&S and were delighted to receive an outstanding award once again, building further upon our previous successful audits.
