Later the WIJPS Choir joined together with other primary schools to form a children's choir at the Yom HaShoah UK Commemoration Ceremony at The Holocaust Memorial (in The Dell, Hyde Park), in the presence of the Chief Rabbi, the Mayor of London and Holocaust Survivors. They sang 'Never Again', a song composed in memory of those who perished in the Holocaust, and 'Oseh Shalom'. The choir, consisting of pupils in Years 4-6, were honoured to be a part of this important annual event.



Encouraging everyone working within and with the school to give of their best at all times


